UNT Wingspan Event Debate Reunion



The University of North Texas has a long history of speech and debate excellence. The university was officially founded in 1890 and 2015-2016 marked the 125th anniversary of its founding. The university held a number of events to commemorate the birth of the university and UNT Debate was invited to participate in the

"Wingspan" series of events in April of 2016. The UNT Debate celebration and reception took place April 15, 2016, in the Alumni Gateway arch in the Gateway Center. The UNT

Debate team and the College of Arts and Sciences invited Alumnae back to campus to celebrate over 100 years of debate at North Texas.

The event's keynote speaker was Robert Early (class of '83) who is current President and CEO of JPS Health Network and former Texas House of Representatives member. Mr. Earley spoke about the impact North Texas Debate



had on his life in politics, business, and even personal affairs.

UNT Debate members Maggie McGehee (sophomore, political science major) and Megan Hill (junior, business major) teamed up with Curtis Loveless (class of '66) and Cliff McKenzie (class of '74) to create a public debate. The four mixed up teams (one current student and one Alumni on the affirmative, the other student and Alumni taking the negative) and debated the proposition Resolved: that the 1960s was the best time to be a UNT Student. The debate was a fun-filled affair with discussions of popular culture, politics and pride.

Tournament Wins



At the University of Texas at Dallas Tournament, held January 2-4, senior Hope Sauceda (Political Science) and senior Darrian Carroll (Political Science) were in the top three debate teams at a tournament with over 20 schools. They were the 6th and 7th best speakers at the tournament as well. They also attended the University of California at Berkley January 6-8. They placed in the

top 40 at that tournament. Carroll and Sauceda were ranked as the 37th best 2-person debate team in the country!

At the Wichita State University Debate Tournament, held January 22-24, Victor Martinez (freshman, International Studies) and Luis Avila (freshman, RTVF) finished in third place in Junior Varsity. Victor Martinez was also named the tournament's 3rd best speaker.

Finally, at Tarrant County College on January 22-23, Garrett Hammonds (sophomore, Communication Studies) and Abron Hester (sophomore, Political Science) were the runners up in Parliamentary debate. Hammonds also placed 4th in Poetry at the tournament.

All State Debaters



Garrett Hammonds (Sophomore, Communication Studies major) and Abron Hester (Sophomore, Political Science Major) were recently named to the All State Texas Forensics Squad. The All State Squad recognized these two debaters on an elite squad of Texas's best speakers.

The two competed together in the Texas Interscholastic Forensics Association's parliamentary debate division. Hester

and Hammonds qualified for the quarterfinals, meaning they finished in the top 8 of the state's best debate teams.

FACULTY SPOTLIGHT


New Faculty Member: Dr. Joe McGlynn

The Department of Communication Studies is excited to announce the hiring of Dr. Joseph "Joe" McGlynn as its newest faculty member. He will begin his appointment in the Fall 2016 semester and will teach courses in health, interpersonal, and organizational communication. Dr. McGlynn received his Ph.D. from the University of Texas at Austin in 2014. For the past two years, he served as a Postdoctoral Fellow for the Austin-based Center of Identity, a research center addressing online identity management, privacy, and security. Dr. McGlynn is an alum of UNT,



receiving his M.A. in Communication Studies from UNT in 2006 and his B.A. in Psychology from UNT in 2002. Dr. McGlynn's research addresses "the intersection of health communication and technology, with a focus on how communication and technology converge to affect thought, intention, and action in health contexts." His work has been published in the *Journal of Health Communication, Management Communication Quarterly*, the *Western Journal of Communication*, and other prominent outlets. "We are very pleased to bring Joe back to UNT," said department chair Brian Richardson. "Not only will he reinvigorate our health communication area, he's also exceptional in the classroom, and has a proven track record in developing productive research collaborations."



The Cookie Jar


Written and directed by Kyle A. Hammonds and Matea Ivanovic.

The characters in THE COOKIE JAR experience a variety of eerily familiar communication phenomena related to unchecked entitlement and violent masculinity, as presented in the context of a contemporary fairy tale horror.

Wallflowers

Compiled, written and directed by undergraduate Emily McCormick.

Wallflowers explores Judith Butlers notion of creation in that women are born neutral bodied and are then taught to be woman through a series of repetitive acts. Our show uses the 5 stages of the tulip in order to portray the growth and death of female sexuality. Our cast discusses our perception of our sexuality and the worlds perception of our sexuality through a series of performances that make up an "Ourstory" as opposed to a "Mystory".





Burning Times

Compiled, written and directed by Sarah Friday.

Burning Times explores the conflation of witch and woman by examining the iconicity of the witch, various histories regarding the American and European witch burnings, as well as contemporary manifestations of our own modern day "burning times." By playing in the shadows, Burning Times sheds light on the expressions of women's power, both culturally and supernaturally.
